

This is a Story from 'A Few Forgotten Women'



This story was written, in January 2023, as one of a series resulting from the 'A Few Forgotten Women Friday' collaborative research project, investigating the lives of girls from Leeds, Girls' Industrial School, Yorkshire.

Sarah Elizabeth Ramsden

When the girls were allocated to researchers, we were unaware that Sarah Elizabeth Ramsden and Sarah Ramsdill were the same person, so two of our volunteers worked independently and fortunately came to similar conclusions. We have dovetailed their accounts together.

Sarah Elizabeth Ramsden was born in Leeds and baptised at St Peter's Church, Leeds, on 30 August 1857. Her date of birth is noted on her baptism record as 10 May 1857. Her parents were William Ramsden, a cloth dresser, and Rebecca Ramsden. They lived in Waller Street, Leeds [source 1].

Sarah's birth was recorded in civil registration records for the June quarter of 1857. Her mother's maiden name was WALTON. GRO Reference: 1857 J Quarter in LEEDS Volume 09B Page 374

Sarah's parents were married at Leeds Parish Church on 9 November 1856. William was 24, a bachelor, and a cloth dresser, living at Greaves Yard. His father was James Ramsden, also a cloth dresser. Rebecca was 20, a spinster, living at Cornhill. No occupation was noted for Rebecca – indeed no occupation was ever mentioned for Rebecca in any records discovered during this research. Her father was Abraham Walton, a tobacconist. *[source 2]*

Physical Description

Sarah, aged 13, is described as follows on admission to the Leeds Ragged School on 10 August 1870: "Red hair, light blue eyes, tall and well built, light complexion, hair on arms, thick lips and nose, teeth well set. Burn on first finger of right hand. Warts on middle finger of ditto."

Sarah did not seem to have had much education, the register notes:

Schools attended: ? ? Church School, St Stephens Church School, altogether 6 months.

Read: Little, Write: Little, Cipher: No

Sarah had worked briefly at Miss Marshall for 2 weeks, and at ? Bridge Street for 1 month.

The register describes the offence for which Sarah was admitted to the Ragged School as "Stealing & incorrigible". For this, William Bruce, Esq, Stipendiary Magistrate, sentenced her to 3 years. The register notes "Time up 10 August 1870". There is no mention of what Sarah stole, but Sarah's previous character is described thus: "For some time past has been very dishonest and disobedient parents could not manage her"

The register notes her parents, and also lists other people she knew:

The following appeared in the Yorkshire Post and Leeds Intelligencer on 2nd October 1871.

Siblings

Sarah was William and Rebecca Ramsden's eldest child. A total of 10 children were born to the couple over 19 years. 8 of the children appear to have

survived to adulthood. The list of children is as follows: (All references to births or deaths may be obtained from the General Record Office website www.gro.gov.uk)

The names of Sarah's siblings were found by searching for births with the surname Ramsden in Leeds during the relevant years and selecting those where the mother's maiden name was Walton. The results were compared with the census entries for the family which are set out below.

Two of Sarah's siblings, Henry, (born 1859) and Bessie, (born 1868), died in childhood. As was common, the family recycled the names for later-born children.

GRO records showed two children named Henry Ramsden who died in the March and June quarters of 1861 in Leeds aged 1. It is most likely that the Henry Ramsden who died in the March quarter of 1861 was Sarah's brother. First, there is a baptism record on 23 January 1863 for Henry Ramsden (whose birth date was noted as 15 June 1861) son of William Ramsden, cloth presser

and Rebecca [source 4]. Maybe Henry was very ill, and his parents decided to have him baptised. If this is the case, he lived for another couple of months. Sadly, a burial record for Henry Ramsden can be viewed in the beautifully written records of Beckett St cemetery, where he was buried, aged 1 ¾ - son of William Ramsden of Waller St [source 5]. The names, addresses and Henry's age all appear correct.

Census records alerted me to the death of Bessie (born 1868). "Bessey", aged 2, appears on the 1871 census. The 1881 census lists "Bessy", aged 4. Although it is common for errors in ages to be made in the census, all other ages appeared consistent, and the children at home at census time were always entered in order of age, with the eldest first. Sure enough, her death was found after a short search. She was buried in Beckett St cemetery [source 6]. (Note: the GRO records show the spellings "Bessie" for the daughter born in 1868 and "Bessy" for the daughter born in 1876. The census spellings vary).

On 18th January 1879 at the age of 20, Sarah's eldest brother James joined the Lincolnshire Regiment 10th Brigade and travelled to India on HMS Serapis. He was working as a Moulder and was 5' 6", with brown hair and eyes, and a fresh complexion. He signed up for 6 years' service, followed by 6 years reserve, and during his time abroad suffered from Febricula (low grade fever of unknown pathology), Haemorrhoids, Ague (Malaria) and Abscesses, and was awarded medals for the Afghan 1879 and 1880 campaigns. [Source 25]

Clearly much further research is possible into the lives of Sarah's other siblings. At this stage, one other point of note is that it appears Henry, born 1864, died relatively young, in 1887. He was buried at Beckett St Cemetery, aged 23, his

profession noted as “barman”, and his address 11 Waller St *[source 7]*. His age, address, and profession suggest that this is the correct Henry Ramsden.

Census Entries

1861 – Ramsden family - 17 Waller Street Leeds

William Ramsden, Head, Married, Aged 29, Cloth Dresser, Born Leeds, Yorkshire

Rebecca Ramsden, Wife, Married, Aged 24, No occupation noted, born Leeds, Yorkshire

Sarah Elizabeth Ramsden, Daughter, Aged 4, Scholar, born Leeds, Yorkshire

James Ramsden, Son, Aged 2, Scholar, born Leeds, Yorkshire *[source 8]*

To understand where Sarah and her family lived, I consulted maps on the National Library of Scotland website. The Ordnance Survey Large Scale Town Plans (1:500) surveyed 1890 (Yorkshire CCXVIII.2.18)– shows Waller Street - it is marked just coming on to the top right of the map, above Macaulay Street Foundry, and very close to Macaulay Street, where some of her relatives are noted to have lived.

Also Waller Street & Macaulay Street are both shown, as well as St Stephen’s Church where Sarah was baptised on the Ordnance Survey 25 inch to 1 mile, surveyed 1889/90 (Yorkshire CCXVIII.2) <https://maps.nls.uk/view/125642410>

Aire Street, where Sarah’s father worked is the other side of Leeds City Centre, just to the west of the station. Mills are marked on 1890 maps, but none are named as “Ritsons”.

Sarah's father's occupation is usually described as "Cloth dresser". According to dictionaries of old jobs, this was a skilled textile worker who cut woollen cloth with huge shears when it was ready to leave the mill or sheared the nap from it.

1871 census for Leeds Ragged school

There is no entry for Sarah Ramsden in the 1871 census for Leeds Ragged School. However, the census entry for Sarah E Ramsdill, aged 13, born in Leeds, is almost certainly Sarah Elizabeth Ramsden. Based on her baptism record and the GRO entry for her birth it appears that the stated age of 13 is correct, as Sarah would have turned 14 in May 1871, just over one month after the census [source 9]. In addition, the 1871 census entry for Sarah's family does not mention Sarah, but she is found with her family in both the 1861 and 1881 census.

Rebecca Ramsden, Wife, Married, 34, no occupation noted, 34, born Leeds, Yorkshire

James Ramsden, Son, 11, Errand boy, born Leeds, Yorkshire

Henry Ramsden, Son, 6, Scholar, born Leeds, Yorkshire

Alice Ramsden, Daughter, aged 5, born Leeds, Yorkshire

Bessey Ramsden, Daughter, 2, born Leeds, Yorkshire

William Ramsden, Son, 6 months, born Leeds, Yorkshire *[source 10]*

1881 census – Ramsden family 11 Waller Street Leeds

William Ramsden, Head, Married, aged 48 Cloth Dresser, Born Leeds, Yorkshire

Rebecca Ramsden, Wife, Married, aged 44, No occupation noted, Born Leeds, Yorkshire

Sarah Elizabeth Ramsden, Daughter, unmarried, aged 24, General servant, Born Leeds, Yorkshire

Henry, Son, Aged 16, Tapster in a hotel, born Leeds, Yorkshire

Alice, daughter, aged 14, Scholar, born Leeds, Yorkshire

William, son, aged 10, Scholar, born Leeds, Yorkshire

Arthur, son aged 8, Scholar, born Leeds, Yorkshire

Ada, daughter, aged 6, Scholar, born Leeds, Yorkshire

Bessy, daughter, aged 4, Scholar, born Leeds, Yorkshire *[source 11]*

Note that Sarah is at home with her family. No record has been found of further wrongdoing, and she appears to be in work.

1891 census – Ramsden family - 11 Waller Street

William Ramsden, Head, Married, 58, Cloth presser, born Leeds, Yorkshire

Rebecca Ramsden, Wife, Married, 54, no occupation noted, born Leeds, Yorkshire

James Ramsden, Son, 31, Iron Moulder, born Leeds, Yorkshire

William Ramsden, Son, 20, Iron Fitter, born Leeds, Yorkshire

Arthur Ramsden, Son, 18, Iron Moulder, born Leeds, Yorkshire

Ada Ramsden, Daughter, 16, Corset Maker, born Leeds, Yorkshire

Bessie Ramsden, Daughter, 14, Matchbox packer, born Leeds, Yorkshire [*source 12*]

Sarah is no longer shown with her family. In the time since the last census, she may have married, died, gone to prison, or emigrated.

A search for deaths between March quarter 1881 and June quarter 1891 for Sarah Elizabeth Ramsden in all counties found the deaths of three young children. Searching for "Sarah Ramsden" produced more results, but none close to the correct age, or in Yorkshire (although Sarah could have moved).

If Sarah did emigrate, there are no immediately obvious records of her leaving the UK.

It follows that the most likely scenario is that Sarah was married between the 1881 and 1891 census. Initially, it proved difficult to conclusively prove that Sarah did marry, or whom she may have married, although there is a fairly plausible suggestion, which was eventually corroborated with a marriage certificate, see below.

The Ancestry website suggests that Sarah married John Tyers, in Nottingham, in the December quarter of 1886. However, the only document available to view on Ancestry to corroborate this is the Marriage Registration index. While this does indeed indicate that a Sarah Elizabeth Ramsden was married in Nottingham (GRO reference DQ Nottingham 7b 491 1886), there is of course no additional information on the register entry which would confirm this is the correct Sarah. A search on the Free BMD website

<https://www.freebmd.org.uk/cgi/search.pl> for this marriage index entry shows John Watts and Mary Ann Wright as well as Sarah Ramsden and John Tyers. A search on the FindMyPast website <https://www.findmypast.co.uk> reveals a transcription by the Nottinghamshire Family History Society of a marriage entry at St Saviour Church, Nottingham, on 25 December 1886 between Sarah Elizabeth Ramsden and John Tyers. However, a copy of the document transcribed has not been uploaded, and details such as name and profession of the bride's father are not mentioned *[source 13]*.

A search on Free BMD for marriages for Sarah Elizabeth Ramsden between April 1881 (when we know that Sarah was with her family in Leeds) to March 1891 found several entries, including the entry in Nottinghamshire. It has been possible to eliminate most of these from the search, but about 5 marriages remain where the information is insufficient to be sure the correct Sarah has been found.

The marriage certificate for the marriage of Sarah Elizabeth Ramsden and John Tyers was obtained *[Source 24]*. This confirmed the place of marriage to be St. Saviours Church in Nottingham. The marriage took place on 25 December 1886. Sarah's father is stated to be William Ramsden, a cloth tenter, which matches what had already been learnt about Sarah's father. The bride and groom were both resident at 14 Glebe Street. John is stated to be a Painter, and his father Henry a bootmaker. The only piece of information which appears wrong is Sarah's age, which is stated to be 25, rather than 29. It is possible that Sarah mis-stated her age so as to appear younger than her husband (who was 27).

The witnesses to the marriage were the splendidly named Temperance Tyers and William Wright.

Temperance Tyers was found in the 1881 census, aged 10, living with her father, Henry, mother Emma and other siblings. It seems likely that Temperance was John Tyers' sister. *[Source 23]*

1891 Census – Tyers family - 3 Bunter's Hill, Ruddington, Notts

John Tyers, Head, Married, Aged 35, White Washer (a pencil note above states "Plaster") Born Ruddington, Nottinghamshire

Sarah Tyers, Wife, Married, Aged 32, Washerwoman, Born Leeds, Yorkshire
[source 14]

The following entry for the Tyers family appears in the 1901 census:

1901 Census – Tyers family – 4 Willford Road, Ruddington

John Tyers, Head, Married, Aged 46, House Decorator, born Ruddington, Nottinghamshire

Sarah Tyers, Wife, Married, Aged 44, No occupation noted, born Leeds

John H Tyers, Son, Aged 5, Born ditto (i.e., Leeds, although GRO shows it was Notts) *[source 15]*

The census enumerator appears to have had "yes" added to the column labelled "Deaf & dumb, blind, lunatic, feeble-minded" for both Sarah and her son. Obviously there is no further information about what this meant, or even if the entry is correct.

The birth of John Henry Tyers is noted in civil registration indexes for births in the June quarter of 1895 GRO Reference: 1895 J Quarter in BASFORD Volume 07B Page 296. His mother's maiden surname is Ramsden. The birth is registered in the Basford district, Nottinghamshire, although the 1901 census suggests his place of birth was Leeds. It is possible that Sarah returned to Leeds to give birth and later registered the birth in Nottinghamshire. It's also possible that the census entry is incorrect.

Neither Sarah nor her husband John Tyers could be found in the 1911 census. However, the following entry appears likely to be for their son:

1911 census – John Tyers – Arnor Hill, Ruddington, Notts

John Tyers, Head, Single, Aged 15, Domestic servant, Notts, Ruddington [*source 16*]

Although this census entry implies that John was living on his own, aged 15, the previous census entry is also for Arnor Hill. It is possible that John was living in a tied cottage at his workplace, rather than living independently at a young age.

Death of Sarah

As Sarah and her husband could not be found on the 1911 census, searches were carried out for their deaths. These were duly found in the civil registration records. It appears that John Tyers died in 1908, aged 54 GRO Reference: 1908 S Quarter in BASFORD Volume 07B Page 122. Sarah died in 1909, aged 51 GRO Reference: 1909 S Quarter in BASFORD Volume 07B Page

131. No documents relating to burial have been viewed during this research, thus, without viewing death certificates, it is not possible to be sure these are the correct people, although it appears likely.

Meanwhile, the lives of some of the rest of Sarah's birth family can be traced in the census, as follows:

1901 Census – Ramsden family - 4 Sarah Street, Leeds (off Burmantofts Street, a few streets to the east of Waller Street)

Rebecca Ramsden, Head, Widow, 64, no occupation noted, born, Leeds, Yorkshire

William Ramsden, Son, Single, 30, Mechanician(?) Driller, Leeds, Yorkshire

Arthur Ramsden, Son, Single 28, Felter? Leeds, Yorkshire

Ada Ramsden, Daughter, Single 26, Corset Maker, Leeds, Yorkshire

Bessie Ramsden, Daughter, Single, 24, Tailor Machinist? Leeds Yorkshire

James Ramsden, Grandson, single, 18, Cloth Dresser, Leeds, Yorkshire [*source 17*]

As Rebecca, Sarah's mother, is now a widow, a search confirmed that William Ramsden, Sarah's father, died in 1894, aged 62 GRO Reference: 1894 S Quarter in LEEDS Volume 09B Page 253

It was interesting to see that Rebecca's grandson was living with the family. Further research is required to confirm who his parents were.

1911 Census – Ramsden family - 6 Leith Street, Leeds (a few roads north of Sarah Street, off Accommodation Road).

Rebecca Ramsden, Head, 74, Widow, no occupation, Leeds, Yorkshire
William Ramsden, Son, 40, Single, Iron Foundry worker, Leeds, Yorkshire
Arthur Ramsden, Son, 38, Single, Iron Foundry worker, Leeds Yorkshire [*source 18*]

Rebecca Ramsden, Sarah's mother, cannot be found in the 1921 Census. Her death was recorded in 1913 D GRO Reference: 1913 D Quarter in LEEDS Volume 09B Page 547.

A search was made of the 1921 census for William and Arthur, who were living with Rebecca in 1911. William could not be found (although no death was found either). However, the following entry was found for Arthur:

1921 Census – Hall Family - 23 Stony Rock Road, Leeds
John James Hall, Head, 44, married, born in Yorkshire, painter in Engineer's Shop
Ada Hall, Wife, 46, married, born in Leeds, household duties
Alfred Hall, Son, 13, Single, born in Leeds, full time education
Arthur Ramsden, brother in law, 48, single, Engineer Labourer, Lawsons Engineers, Hope Foundry [*source 19*]

It seemed likely that Ada hall was Arthur's sister, and further research confirmed that Ada Ramsden married John James Hall in July 1907 [*Source 20*]

John Henry Tyers – later life

A transcription of Airman's records appears on Ancestry, for John Henry Tyers, aged 20, born 16 June 1895 in Ruddington, Nottinghamshire, Service Date 12 November 1915, service number 15243, next of kin, Sarah Pike, Aunt. John Henry Tyers enlists in the Royal Flying Corp (RFC: the air arm of the British Army) on 12th November 1915 at the age of 20. His papers show his date of birth as 16th June 1895 and his service number: 15243. He is 5' 9 ½" tall with fair hair, blue eyes, and a ruddy complexion. His civilian occupation is Valet and his role in the RFC is Batman, rank 'A. Mech. 1'. He retained the role of Batman, with a rank change to 'Private 1' following the merger of the RFC and Royal Navy Air Service to form the Royal Air Force on 1st April 1918. He was appointed Corporal on 1st July 1919 and discharged to the RAF Reserves on 18th December 1919 having served his 4 years.^{25 26} There is a WWI Pension Cards/Ledgers record which I unfortunately can't view without a Fold3 subscription. *[Source 21]*

It appears that John survived the 1st World War, based on this entry in the 1921 census for the household of the Earl Of Kimberley, Kimberley House, Wydmondham, Norfolk:
John Henry Tyers, Servant, Aged 26, Male, Single, born Nottinghamshire, Ruddington, Occupation Chauffeur. *[Source 22]*

The age and place of birth seem correct, and if John had been an airman during the war, it seems plausible that he might have become a chauffeur.
