This is A Few Forgotten Women Story



This story was written in August 2023 as one of a series resulting from the 'A Few Forgotten Women Friday' collaborative research project, investigating the lives of women who enrolled in the first two cohorts [1908 & 1909] of Trainee Teachers at the Cheshire Country Training College, Crewe [CCTCC]

Mary Hassall's Story

Mary was born on 9 October 1890 at 58 Ford Lane, Crewe.

The extract from the GRO's birth register shows her parents as Charles Hassall, a joiner (journeyman), and Betsy Hassall, formerly Turner.¹



Charles Hassall and Betsy Turner had married about six months previously.² A little extra digging seems to suggest that Betsy was, in fact, the sister of Charles' first wife Emma Turner, who died in 1885.³

(The 1911 Census shows that Betsy Turner had had only one child (Mary), although the 1891 Census shows that Charles and Betsy had three daughters living with them. The church register for Charles' first marriage to Emma Turner shows that one of the witnesses was Betsy Turner, with the bride's father shown as Thomas Turner.⁴ A quick look back to the 1861 Census finds Thomas, his wife Jane, and children including Emma and Betsy living in Haslington near Crewe.⁵)

The 1891 Census shows that the Hassall family were still living at 58 Ford Lane,⁶ while in 1901 they had moved around the corner to 3 Fletcher Street.⁷

On 7 September 1903 Mary started at Crewe Secondary School.⁸ In 1908 she received her preliminary certificate with a distinction for science.⁹ For the next two years Mary was one of about 60 students who completed her teacher training at the newly-opened Cheshire County Training College. In 1972 she shared her recollections of those times for the Old Students' magazine, *The Torch*:¹⁰

"In 1908 a group of about 60 students attended the Opening Ceremony of the Cheshire County Training College, Crewe, for Teachers. None of us that day could have visualised how the College would expand to its present proportions. There was no gymnasium for the women with drill, marching and country dancing being all we had. Discipline was strict, a curfew at 10pm. We had badges, blazers, hats and ties in our colours of blue and gold and were expected to wear them. The following hair of today would not be allowed back then, on arrival at college we had to style our hair in the very

formidable adult 'upswept' style. Few of us original students remain to keep in touch."

Mary is known to have played hockey for the College and appears in this team photo.¹¹ (She is believed to be one of the players on the back row, although which one is uncertain.)



The 1911 Census shows that the Hassall family had moved across the road and were now living at 2 Fletcher Street.¹²

This shows Charles (aged 59, a joiner working on his own account), his wife Betsy (aged 54) and Mary (aged 20, an elementary school teacher employed by the Town Council). No information has been found to shed any light on Mary's teaching career. It is likely, however, that she would have given up work when she married.

In 1917 Mary married Fred Stubbs.¹³ Together they had two daughters: Kathleen, born in 1918,¹⁴ and Freda, born in 1920.¹⁵ When the 1921 Census was taken Mary's family were living in her former family home at 2 Fletcher Street.¹⁶ The household comprised Fred (aged 32, working as an accounts clerk for the London & North West Railway Company), Mary (aged 30, domestic duties) and children Kathleen (aged 2) and Freda (aged 10 months). Mary's parents, Charles and Betsy Hassall, were also living at the same address (registered as a separate household).

In 1929 the Cheshire County Training College celebrated its 21st anniversary, and Mary was made a life member of the Old Students' Association.¹⁷ The same publication notes her address as being 60 Nelson Street, Crewe.

Mary and her husband Fred were still living at 60 Nelson Street in 1939.¹⁸ Mary was shown as doing unpaid domestic duties while her husband Fred was a railway clerk. Also living with them was their younger daughter, Freda (working as a shorthand typist) and Mary's mother Betsy (a widow, recorded as being incapacitated).

Mary's husband died in 1949.¹⁹ The local newspaper reported that the funeral took place in the churchyard of Haslington Parish Church.²⁰ In addition to family members there were representatives from LNWR's Locomotive Accountants Office, and also from the General Offices Ex-Servicemen's Association.

In 1958 the Training College celebrated its golden anniversary and Mary was among those attending a special reunion event held on 4 October.²¹ In 1962 it was reported in 'The Torch' that Mary had moved to London.²²

In 1968 the college celebrated its Diamond Jubilee.²³ The usual Reunion weekend was held at the beginning of October, with ex-students visiting the college. There were games of netball, badminton, and tennis, with old girls playing against current students; a dance; whist drive; an afternoon tea, and films and drama productions performed by current students.

On the Friday night a buffet supper was held preceded with a discussion on the education of women, between Mrs Shirley Williams MP (then a Labour Education Minister) and Dr Kathleen Ollerenshaw (a member of staff). All the great and the good of Cheshire Education Committee were in attendance, and the evening was much enjoyed by all. On Saturday at the afternoon tea a huge cake in the shape of a diamond, decorated in the college colours of blue and gold, was cut by Mary (as the oldest ex-student present) Miss B Pym (the youngest student at the college).

Mary passed away on 13 November 1980, aged 90.²⁴ She was buried in St Michael's Churchyard, Haslington, with her husband Fred.²⁵
